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Summer FAQs:

Q. Why is my lawn brown?

A. Most likely, your lawn is experiencing summer stress (going dormant due to heat and drought). Less common causes of browning are lawn-damaging insects and fungal disease.

Q. What are these brown polka dots in my lawn?

A. Sounds like Dollar Spot! This is a very common summer fungus that usually reacts to a few days of heavy rainfall. Our Soil Enrichment Program will help stop the fungus in it's tracks, and in a few mows you should see it disappear completely.

Q. How much should I water?

A.1-2 inches of water per week. Water less frequently, but for longer periods of time to ensure a good, deep drench.

Q. How low should I mow my lawn?

A. No lower than 4 inches during the summer. Tall grass creates shade for itself and helps keep the soil temperature low during extreme heat.

Pest of the Month: Mosquitoes The Three D's of Mosquito Control



It's summertime and you know what that means... mosquitoes!

Not only are they annoying to deal with, but they pose a major health threat. Lucky for you, Lawn Doctor is here with the **Three Ds of Mosquito Control** in your yard!

- Drain: Reduce the chances of a mosquito population forming in your yard by eliminating their breeding grounds. Standing water spots like clogged gutters/drains, bird baths, tires, wheelbarrows, etc. are what they like best.
- 2. Dress: Keep yourself protected by wearing mosquitoappropriate clothing. Long sleeves, long pants, and closedtoed shoes will prevent mosquitoes from making you their dinner!
- 3. **Defend**: Periodic control treatments & continued preventative measures will impede these pests from re-claiming your yard. Hiring a pest control professional (like Lawn Doctor!) is the best thing you can do for your peace of mind this summer.

On The Lookout:

Common Summer Weeds

Crabgrass:

Arguably the most stubborn of the common summer weeds, crabgrass plagues almost every lawn in New England on an annual basis. Thriving in the high temperatures and receding in the cooler ones, the best way to prevent it altogether is by keeping your lawn thick, strong and healthy, leaving crabgrass less room to grow.

Spurge:

Another tricky summer weed, spurge survives and grows in many different soil and climate conditions. It is even able to withstand the lowest of mowing heights. Although it may take multiple tries, standard weed controls should do the trick.

Nutsedge:

Also known as chufa, nutgrass, or watergrass, nutsedge isn't actually a weed, but a *Sedge*. It grows more rapidly than turf in the summer months and slower in the cooler months, which can make it more difficult to spot amongst standard turf.

Lawn Damaging Pests

Sod Webworm:

We know you're familiar with moths flying around during any given summer night, but did you know they can drop eggs that will hatch, then feed on your lawn at the crown? Sod webworms tend to fly under the radar of summer threats, but we're telling you- don't underestimate them!

Chinch Bug:

Chinch bugs thrive in the heat and even lay their eggs in the open, warm areas of the yard. Once they hatch, they feed on the roots of the grass while simultaneously releasing toxins that can be extremely detrimental to a lawn.

The Magic of Mushrooms

Mushrooms come in all different shapes and sizes and tend to pop up virtually overnight. They are a pretty unsightly guest and make for quite the unattractive landscape. Believe it or not, they're actually a good thing to see in the lawn!





All lawns have fungus, good and bad. It's when that fungus flowers due to the perfect mix of environmental factors (moisture, shade, and organic soil matter) that mushrooms will appear. In short-seeing mushrooms in the lawn is a good indicator that your lawn and soil are bal-

anced, eco-diverse, & overall healthy!

If they're too bothersome to keep in the lawn, knocking them over and allowing them to dry out is the best way to rid them. Avoiding heavy shade, compacted soil, and rotting materials will help keep them out altogether.
